Product Description:

Leganto, the Ex Libris course resource list solution, enables you to streamline access to course materials and reduce their cost by leveraging library collections, expertise, and services. Instructors can easily build lists of resources that include all material types, librarians can provide resources more efficiently and scale up to support more courses, and students can access all course materials in one place and from any device.

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Notes:

This report was created upon completion of accessibility evaluations performed between November 2020 and June 2021 and was limited only to the evaluation of specific accessibility issues that were already reported. The report is considered accurate at the time of publishing. Ex Libris is committed to providing an experience that is fully accessible to everyone and that all pages of its web application comply with web accessibility guidelines. Due to the scale and complex nature of the Leganto product, this is an ongoing effort. This report includes an evaluation of the frequently used aspects of the Leganto solution, evaluated in both Student and Instructor roles. This sampling of pages used in the assessment included the Leganto *Lists*, *List*, and *Citation* views and their associated designs, functions, and controls.

Evaluation Methods Used:

A combination of automated and manual testing techniques was employed for the accessibility assessment.

Manual assessment was performed using Chrome/NVDA on Windows 10 and included exclusive use of the keyboard.

Automated tools used included the Deque aXe browser extension & Deque aXe Auditor 2.2.
